Importance of Data in Priority Setting


Data:

- Educates relevant parties
- Substantiates decisions made
- Tracks progress towards success

Types of Data and Examples:

- Platform-based (Zen City)
- Report-based (Annual Reports, Departmental Plans)
- Anecdotal (Council Town Halls, Talks with Tai, Chief Thompson's Community Meetings)
