#### **PURPOSE**:

The City Manager's Office submits the FY24 Earmark funding lists to Council for consideration and approval, in anticipation of the review process of the City of Greensboro's official FY24 Earmark Funding Requests to the Offices of Congresswoman Kathy Manning and Senator Tom Tillis.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

Congress has revived Congressionally Directed Spending requests, also known in the House of Representatives as Community Project Funding requests (earmarks). This authority allows for direct federal funding to support local projects that enhance community priorities, transportation, health care, education, job opportunities, and other important economic development projects. In restoring earmarks, Congress has placed additional restrictions on eligibility and increased transparency requirements.

The House Appropriations Committee on Feb. 28, 2023, released the fiscal year (FY) 2024 guidance for Community Project Funding.

As part of their national platform to lower federal spending, the total sum of FY 2024 earmarks in the House will not exceed one-half of 1 percent of discretionary spending. The Senate guidance remains the same as in the 117th Congress, with funding not to exceed 1 percent.
