



RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING A POLICY TO PROMOTE THE USE OF NATIVE PLANTS AND THE ELIMINATION OF INVASIVE PLANTS AT CITY-OWNED AND MAINTAINED SITES AND FACILITIES







Why are Native Plants Important?

 Native plants provide habitat, shelter, and food for wildlife – birds, mammals, insects, and aquatic life

 Native plants are important for the purposes of land reclamation, soil health, and water protection

 Native plants require much less watering, fertilizer, and pesticides. In fact, they can prevent water run-off and improve air quality.



Proposed City Native Plant Policy

- Applies to:
 - all City-owned or maintained site and facilities;
 - o all new or replacement plantings in outdoor landscaped areas;
 - all City departments, contractors, and subcontractors.
- Requires use of native plants & seeds (USDA southeast states, & other resources) to maximum extent practicable, with a minimum of 50% by 2025.
- Exceptions for edible plantings, turf grass, state/federal regulations, remediation plantings, zoological exhibits, and botanical displays.
- Prohibits use of invasive plant species (NC Native Plant Society & NC Invasive Plant Council).
- Requires use of "right plant right place" principles to avoid potential conflicts.
- Includes public education and outreach regarding native and invasive plants.
